Continuing with the Egyptian theme, we performed our own "mummification" using 3D organs that we made. The class conducted our first STEAM project "apple slice in canopic jars". Canopic jars were jars used in Ancient Egyptian to preserve organs removed during mummification. Test were conducted to ascertain which mixture best preserved the "Apple slice", we observed over the course of 4 days. Each day the students recorded what they saw, smelled and noting down any change in colour.





































As the summative assessment week is approaching the English Language Acquisition Capable class is inquiring about ATL skills and the purpose of them in our learning. In this unit, the focus relies on critical thinking skill, specifically "How we evaluate arguments and evidence?" To do so, we created an activity featuring a pretended scenario, in which I found a bag on a bus in Zengcheng. The task consists in finding out whose bag it is and to make a sensible infer, students have to analyse and the items in it and evaluate the reliability of such item in order to conclude whose bag is it. After a group discussion, students realized that not all the objects that a person carries a bag might be theirs or reveals something about their identity, and they discussed which articles were more useful for finding out about the owner of the bag. As a conclusion, we observed that it is barely impossible to be sure of the accuracy of primary sources and several different profiles of the person can be built













up as we interpret items (the same thing goes for stories and some texts) differently.


