In Miss Jane's Year three music class students were looking at Body Music and how our bodies can be used as percussive instruments. Students worked on a class performance which incorporates whole class choreography, small group choreography and improvisation with a backing track, all whilst learning how to read some simple rhythmic notation.

It was an incredible experience and a real opportunity to get in touch with nature and to think about the connection we have with our planet.

We had a member of UNESCO who took us on a Geo Park tour where conservation remained an ongoing focus, as well as learning about indigenous plant and marine life. 





















































Year 11 CAS students spent the week in a minority Yao village called Heishan. There they stayed with families and joined their hosts for dinner one evening. Activities included hiking through the rice terraces, watching a traditional Yao theatre performance, digging for potatoes and harvesting ginger. There were two main service projects: at the local primary school, they painted colourful playground games and wall pictures and taught the children English, as well as how to use playground games.





































At a nearby retirement home, they learned and joined in card games and learned how to weave baskets of bamboo from the residents. They did a deep clean of the dining room and gave is a complete make-over with freshly painted walls and original artwork produced during the visit.



















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They also revitalised the garden by removing weeds and working with the residents to make bamboo trellises and plant passion fruit vines along with some other beautiful flowers. Integrating, learning, having fund and working with the residents at the retirement home, the children in the primary school, our hosts in our homestays and each other made the trip an experience to remember.










